What is Community Choice Energy?

In Massachusetts, a city government can choose a new supplier for all residential and business customers. Community Choice Energy protects residents from winter price spikes and makes renewable energy affordable for every household without raising rates. Electric bills still come from the utility and any household can opt out of the city's plan. With CCE, you can tell the 'clean energy' salespeople: "I'm buying clean energy with my neighbors through Boston's CCE, so don't call again"

In Melrose and Dedham, Community Choice Energy has added renewable energy to residents' electricity mix while keeping electricity rates competitive and even producing savings. Many other communities are planning for Community Choice Energy.
